



Career Pathway Spotlight:

Automobile Maintenance and Light Repair

Students in this pathway will learn the basic skills needed to gain employment as a maintenance and light repair technician. Students will be exposed to courses in automotive preventative maintenance and servicing and replacing brakes, and steering and suspension components. In addition, general electrical system diagnosis and electrical theory is taught to foster critical thinking and sound decision-making. The end of the pathway assessment (EOPA) is aligned with ASE/NATEF standards and are an excellent foundation for the entry-level technician.

Industry Spotlight: Castellini



Castellini's Group of Companies combines to form one of the largest distributors of fresh produce in the United States. In 2015, The Company opened a new state of the art facility to process and distribute fresh produce to leading wholesale, retail and food service customers. The facility is located north of Forest Park in the northern section of Clayton County. Castellini has created 300 jobs and has committed an investment of \$52 million to the project.

Work-Based Learning (WBL) instructors visited Castellini as the first WBL "Get Into Industry Initiative" for the school year. "Get Into Industry" is a CTAE initiative designed to increase WBL instructor's knowledge of today's business and industry environment.

Atlanta Airport Community Job Fair Produces Job Offers for 50 Clayton County Work-Based Learning Students

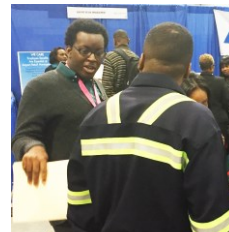

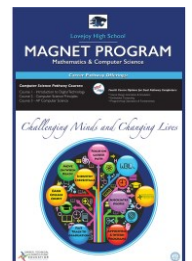

The students also learned how to use the EV3 programming language to move their robots across the floor and pick up objects.



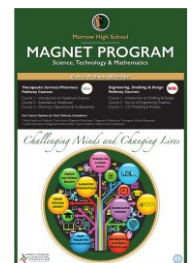
- ✓  It's that time of year again, on Saturday, November 5th, the Clayton County School System – together with the Safe America Foundation, Allstate Foundation, UPS®, Montlick & Associates, Cobb and Fulton County Public Schools, and the Clayton County Board of Commissioners' Chairman, Jeff Turner to host Brain Camp III™ – a FREE fun-filled education safety expo for middle and high school students and parents at the Delta Flight Museum (near Hartsfield –Jackson Atlanta Airport) from 9:00 a.m. until 1:00 p.m. Superintendent Luvenia Jackson's initiative seeks to expose student to careers in aviation and to promote safety behaviors to our youth.

- ✓ Mount Zion High School's Audio-Video Technology & Film (AVFT) instructor, Tarena Ruff hosted a state-wide Industry Certification training session. Over 20 AVFT teachers visited the program, which successfully completed Industry Certification in April, 2016. Ms. Shannon Phillips, Executive Director of the Media Education Foundation of Georgia, selected Mount Zion because the Industry Certification review board determined that the program exceeded industry standards and procedures. The AVFT program was the first to be certified in Clayton County Public Schools.

- ✓ 9th Grade CCPS students begin at Atlanta Technical College: CCPS implemented two new magnet programs: Lovejoy High School Computer Science and Mathematics Magnet Program and Morrow High School Science. Technology & Mathematics Magnet Program is "Challenging Minds and Changing Lives" by moving on when ready.



The Move on Ready (MOWR) program allows students to attend a postsecondary institution during their high school matriculation to receive high school and college credit simultaneously while attending full/part-time classes through Atlanta Technical College.
